Ayers and the Full Range of FAIS Team's Work

Johana Ayers was named Managing Director of GAO's Forensic Audits and Investigative Services (FAIS) team in 2016 following the retirement of Steve Lord. Her 60-member team's goal is to provide Congress with high quality forensic audits and investigations of fraud, waste, and abuse; special investigations and security/vulnerability assessments. She came to the team with 18 years' experience having spent the first 15 years of her career working in the Acquisition and Sourcing Management (ASM) team.



While in ASM, Ayers led reviews on contracting in Iraq and Afghanistan, DOD contract management and oversight, the defense industrial base, and the intelligence community's reliance on contractors. Her team's work led to significant improvements in the efficiency and effectiveness of federal contracting efforts, contributed to the debate on technology transfer policy, and led to improved congressional oversight. Ayers also served as the head of GAO's office in Baghdad during two, 7-month periods, first in 2008 and again in 2010, representing GAO before senior defense, diplomatic, and development officials and enabling GAO to provide first-hand analysis and assessments of the U.S. government's efforts to stabilize and rebuild Iraq. Then, in 2013, Ayers joined the Defense Capabilities and Management (DCM) team. While in DCM, she helped establish the Defense Business Operations portfolio, which encompassed reviews related to management efficiencies, business transformation, and budgets at the Department of Defense.

Ayers told *Management News* that she spent the first six months on the job getting to know the team members and learning the nature of their work. She was particularly impressed with the impact and reach FAIS has with a government-wide focus and working with multiple committees. "Last year, we did work for 30+ committees and subcommittees. It was the range of work we did that really struck me," said Ayers.

FAIS is the only team with investigators that support the agency. There are six undercover investigators who work on a variety of issues and last year did work in the areas of nuclear regulation and the Affordable Health Care Act, for example.

"I'm continually impressed by the dedication and enthusiasm of the staff and am very proud of what they've accomplished individually and together," said Ayers. "FAIS analysts and investigators' work done jointly with HC, for example, resulted in statutory changes that should improve the functioning of the VA's Veteran's Crisis Line, helping ensure that America's veterans get the help they need, when they need it. Also, FAIS's work has affected the collection of federal taxes. In 2011, based on its data analytics work, FAIS reported in GAO-11-272 that more than 224,000 of about 16 million individuals to whom the State Department issued passports in fiscal year 2008 owed more than \$5.8 billion in unpaid federal taxes as of September 30, 2008. State was not authorized to restrict the issuance of passports to individuals because they owe federal taxes, while federal law prevented the IRS from disclosing taxpayer information to State without taxpayer consent. So, we suggested that Congress consider taking steps to enable and require State to screen and prevent individuals who owe federal taxes from receiving passports. In response, in December 2015, the "FAST" Act, a comprehensive transportation bill, was enacted as law, and included provisions to address our matter for congressional consideration," said Ayers.

Ayers also highlighted the Fraud Risk Management Framework (GAO-15-593SP, July 28, 2015) that FAIS developed to guide federal managers in taking a strategic, risk-based approach to combating fraud in federal programs." The leading practices identified in the Framework have essentially become statutorily required for federal managers thanks to requirements in the Fraud Reduction and Data Analytics Act of 2015, which was enacted last year. Ayers explained that Framework is already changing how agencies think about their fraud risks and design and implement strategies to prevent and detect fraud.

She credits her team and her FAIS predecessors for the accomplishments, "I have been building off the foundation that Steve Lord, Cathy Berrick and Rick Hillman built. This team has had its challenges and I am amazed with what they've accomplished. I am also very excited about the years to come."

Ayers originally moved to Washington DC from Portland, Oregon in 1992. She received her bachelor's degree from the American University in international studies and her master's degree in international affairs from George Washington University. She is married and has two stepsons. They are all big baseball fans who love to go to Nats games. She and her husband also enjoy the advantages of living in D.C. by attending plays, concerts and eating out. Ayers enjoys travelling and in fact, she was in Calcutta, India when the offer came to work at GAO in 1998. She and her husband take an international trip every other year, including a Caribbean cruise last fall.

2017 International Auditor Fellows Have Arrived

This year's International Auditor Fellowship Program (IAFP) began on March 22 with 15 auditors representing 12 countries.

In an opening ceremony, Comptroller General (CG) Gene Dodaro and Chief Operating Officer (COO) Patricia Dalton welcomed the 2017 fellows from Albania, Argentina, Bhutan, Brazil, Estonia, Kuwait, Nigeria, Pakistan, Rwanda, Singapore, Uganda and Zimbabwe.

The IAFP, designed to enhance capabilities of Supreme Audit Institutions (SAIs) to fulfill their missions and increase accountability, transparency and governance worldwide, was initiated by GAO in 1979 in response to increased federal government expenditures abroad and the related need to strengthen accountability over these funds. To date, more than 570 middle- to senior-level SAI officials from more than 105 countries have graduated from the program, many of whom have since become Auditors General, Deputy Auditors General or Government Ministers.

Fellows participate in an intensive, multifaceted learning program that includes a blend of classroom instruction, observation of key management meetings, intergovernmental auditing exposure, and the development of a strategy paper focused on implementing change in their organizations.

"The strength of GAO's fellowship program lies in its various instructional components and the support of hundreds of GAO staff. The combination of classroom training and professional networking facilitate knowledge-sharing and strategic partnerships. In addition, the fellows' strategy papers, ranging from internal controls to



leveraging technology in auditing, offer an opportunity for practical application of concepts learned to help improve audit capacity in their respective SAIs, contributing to the long-term success of the program," said SPEL MD James-Christian Blockwood.
