VA LAUNCHES ONLINE PTSD TOOL



The Department of Veterans Affairs launched a new online tool in June that will help Veterans compare various treatment options for post-traumatic stress disorder.

The PTSD Treatment Decision Aid, located at www.ptsd.va.gov/apps/decisionaid, is a free, interactive online tool that helps educate patients about effective treatment options for PTSD and encourages them to participate actively in de-

cisions about their care.

"By helping to bridge understanding and communication between Veterans and providers about the most effective treatment options available, we are ensuring Veterans receive the treatments that best promote their healing and recovery," said VA Secretary Dr. David J. Shulkin.


ake your dream of owning a home a reality with U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs home loan benefits.

The Providence VA Medical Center highlighted medical advancements and VA research during Research Day Friday, May 19. The event was part of the Department of Veterans Affairs' celebration of National VA Research Week.

This year's theme for Research Week was "VA Research -- Bridging the Gap," which underscored the history of VA research accomplishments that have improved Veterans' lives and advanced American medicine.

Research Day at the Providence VAMC featured guest speakers, including keynote speaker Dr. Sharon Rounds, pulmonary/critical care physician, director of the VA Endothelial Injury and Repair: Cardiopulmonary Vascular Biology Center of Biomedical Research Excellence at the Providence VAMC, and professor of Medicine and of Laboratory and Pathology Medicine at Brown University. There were also poster presentations highlighting many of the more than 240 research projects at the Providence VAMC.
