Agency: Department of Labor & Industries (L&I) / AO 26-15

Subject of possible rule making: Indoor heat exposure and heat illness prevention in all industries. Title 296 WAC, Department of Labor and Industries.

Statutes authorizing the agency to adopt rules on this subject: RCW 49.17.101, 49.17.040, 49.17.050, and 49.17.060.

Reasons why rules on this subject may be needed and what they might accomplish:

In 2021, L&I initiated rulemaking under WSR 21-17-135 to consider occupational heat exposure hazards from high temperatures in all industries, including outdoor and indoor exposures. Subsequently, L&I decided to separate indoor and outdoor heat exposure requirements into phases. Rulemaking related to outdoor heat exposure requirements was completed in June 2023. L&I received a petition for rulemaking on October 15, 2025, requesting changes to L&I's rules to include more specific requirements to prevent heat related illness for indoor workers in all industries.

This rulemaking will consider occupational heat exposure hazards from high temperatures in all industries, and will consider requirements for, but not limited to: trigger temperatures or another measure of environmental conditions stress to the human body, preventative measures (such as water, cooling methods, and rest time/breaks), emergency response measures, training, and planning. Establishing indoor heat exposure requirements benefits employers and employees by providing clear and consistent health and safety standards.

The federal Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA) currently has a national emphasis program regarding indoor heat exposure.
