E2SHB 1686	Health care entity registry	<p>The original version of this bill established a health care entity registry in Title 70 RCW with annual reporting requirements for various health care facilities.</p> <p>The engrossed second substitute bill seeks to “develop a plan and recommendations with the goal of establishing a complete and interactive registry.” The department is tasked with developing the plan and recommendations with consultation from the HCA, OIC, governor’s office, and OFM, as well as input from stakeholders.</p> <p>The plan and recommendations must identify health care entities that would be required to provide regular reports to the registry. These include but are not limited to “licensed and unlicensed facilities, providers, provider groups, systems, carriers, and health care benefit managers.” The department must also identify information that must be reported and fees to be charged to registering entities.</p> <p>The department must consider opportunities to streamline reporting and information sharing, strategies to “fully understand and monitor” the business structure of health care entities in Washington, including elements such as ownership, funding, and affiliations with external organizations. The department would need to provide an update to the legislature by December 31, 2027 and a final report by December 31, 2028. ESSB 5594	Biosimilar and interchangeable biological product access	<p>The purpose of the bill is to remove barriers that restrict access to FDA-approved biosimilar drug products. RCWs 48.43.420(10) and 41.05.410(2)(j) are amended to add biosimilars as an option available to health plans. The original version of the bill also amended RCWs 69.41.120 and 69.41.125 to update the process used by prescribers and pharmacists use to provide substitutions for prescribed trade or brand name drugs or biological products.</p> <p>The engrossed second substitute version of the bill removes the intent section (formerly Section 1) and amends the proposed changes to RCW 69.41.120 so that pharmacists <i>may</i> substitute a therapeutically equivalent generic drug or interchangeable biological product unless the prescribing practitioner specifically requests the prescription be “dispensed as written” or by some other equivalent indication. SHB 1720	Types of medication assistance in community-based care settings	This bill amends the definition of “medication assistance” in RCW 69.41.010(15) for the purpose of expanding the actions available to nonpractitioners providing medication assistance to individuals residing in a community-based or in-home care setting. 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SHB 1009	Membership of the Pharmacy Quality Assurance Commission	<p>SHB 1009 amends RCW 18.64.001 pertaining to individual eligibility to apply for a seat on the Pharmacy Quality Assurance Commission (commission). The bill changes one of the seats reserved only for a licensed pharmacist to allow for a public member who “may be an owner, officer, or operator of a pharmacy, but may not be licensed as a pharmacist or pharmacy technician” to also apply for the seat.</p> <p>The substitute bill adds an additional seat to the commission reserved for a pharmacy technician.</p>	<p>HB 1009 <i>Sponsor(s):</i> Representatives Low, Ramel, and Eslick</p> <p><i>Second Reading (Rules):</i> 3/21/2025 <i>Third Reading/Floor Vote (Senate):</i> 3/26/2025, passed through chamber by majority vote (49/0/0/0).</p>
SHB 1186	Prepackaged medication distribution	<p>RCW 70.41.480(3) creates restrictions for a practitioner or registered nurse to distribute prepackaged emergency medications to patients upon discharge from an emergency department. Effective January 1, 2025, these restrictions include no more than a 48-hour supply that can be dispensed to a patient except when:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> community or hospital pharmacy services will not be available within 48 hours; or human immunodeficiency virus postexposure prophylaxis (HIV PEP) drugs or therapies are required. <p>SHB 1186 amends these exceptions to include when anti-infective drugs or therapies are required or when drugs are packaged directly by the manufacturer in quantities larger than 48 hours (that cannot be altered down to a 48-hour supply), in addition to the above list.</p> <p>The bill also amends RCW 18.64.450 to allow health care entities (HCEs) to dispense and deliver legend drugs and controlled substances beyond the 72-hour limit in the following situations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Community or hospital outpatient pharmacy services will not be available within 72 hours; Anti-infectives or human immunodeficiency virus postexposure prophylaxis (HIV PEP) drugs; or Drugs or therapies packaged directly by the manufacturer for a period longer than a 72-hour period. 	<p>SHB 1186 <i>Sponsor(s):</i> Representatives Parshley, Rule, Low, Reed, Ramel, Macri, Obras, Farivar, Doglio, Fosse, Ormsby, Salahuddin, Bernbaum, and Hill</p> <p><i>Executive Session (Health & Long-Term Care):</i> 3/20/2025, no action taken. <i>Second Executive Session (Health & Long-Term Care):</i> 3/27/2025, striker amendment adopted and passed through committee with a DO PASS recommendation; passed to Rules Committee for second reading (3/29).</p>
