

What is High School to Highways?

High School to Highways (H2H) is an "in-training" opportunity for recent high school graduates seeking full-time career opportunities in highway maintenance, constructions, and other trades alike. Selected candidates are hired into the entry-level Highway Maintenance Worker position with a formal "in-training" plan and paired with a mentor to help provide guidance and support toward obtaining the experience and licensure required to meet the qualifications for career progression. Successful completing of the "in-training" plan is rewarded with a promotion and minimum 5% pay increase!

The Washington State Department of Transportation is the steward of a multimodal transportation system and responsible for ensuring that people and goods move safely and efficiently. It is one of the nation's leading transportation organizations. In addition to building, maintaining, and operating the state highway system, WSDOT is responsible for the state ferry system, and works in partnership with others to maintain and improve local roads, railroads and airports, as well as to support alternatives to driving, such as public transportation, bicycles and pedestrian programs.
