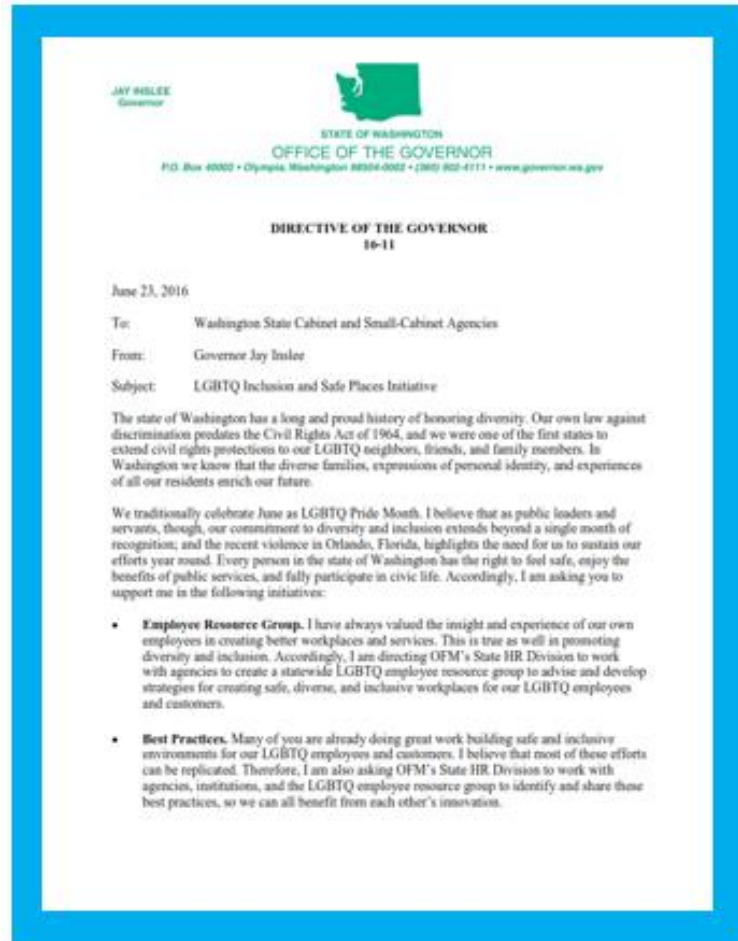

LGBTQ+ Basic Terminology

Sexual Orientation Terms

Gay

Someone who identifies as a **man** and is attracted to people who identify as **men**.

OR

Someone who is attracted to people who are the **same gender** as they are.

OR

An **umbrella term** for LGBTQ+.

Sexual Orientation Terms

Lesbian

Someone who identifies as a **woman** and is attracted to people who identify as **women**.

Bisexual

Someone who is attracted to **more than one** gender.

Gender Identity Terms

Gender

A person's **own** internal sense of identity. Can be man, woman, a combination, neither, or another.

Sex Assigned at Birth

Assignment **given** at birth, usually based on **external anatomy**, as male, female, or intersex.

Gender Identity Terms

Transgender

Someone whose gender identity **does not** align with their sex assigned at birth.

Cisgender

Someone whose gender identity **does** align with their sex assigned at birth.

Gender Identity Terms

Binary

Two opposite categories. With regards to gender, this refers to **male** and **female**.

Non-binary

This is an **umbrella term** for someone who does **not exclusively** identify as male or female.

Additional Terminology

Queer

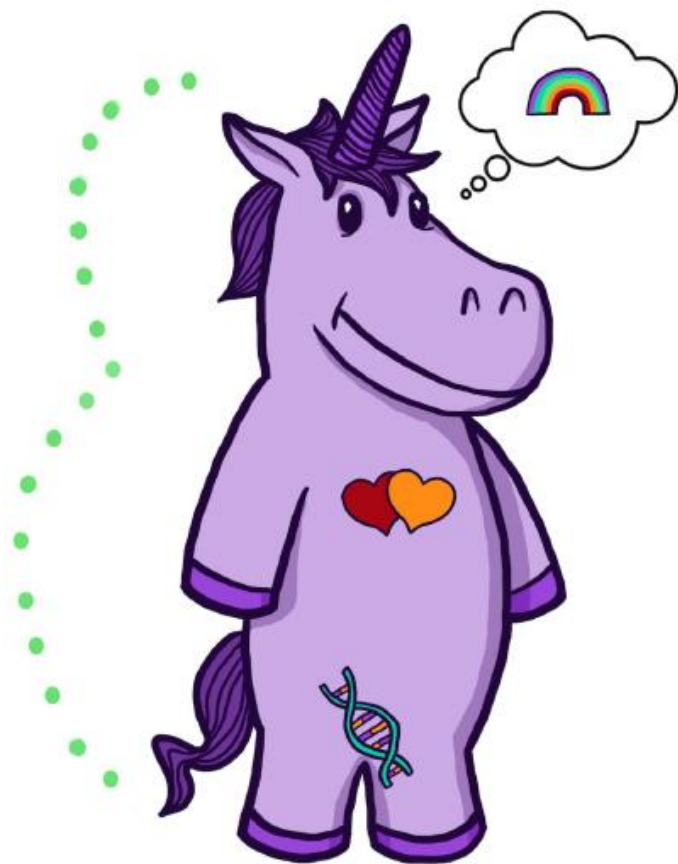
Historically used as a **slur** towards LGBTQ+ individuals.

Has been reclaimed by some as an **umbrella term** for the LGBTQ+ community.

For some it is **still offensive**.

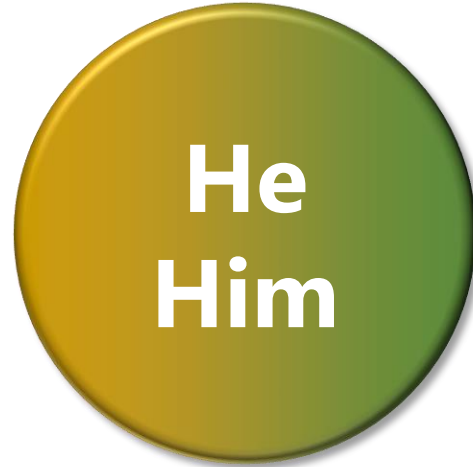

Common Gender Pronouns



The way we refer to others is incredibly **personal**.

It is about treating people with **respect**.

Using Pronouns

She/Her/Hers

She works for the state.
I work with **her**.
That computer is **hers**.

He/Him/His

He works for the state.
I work with **him**.
That computer is **his**.

They/Them/Theirs

They work for the state.
I work with **them**.
That computer is **theirs**.

Xe/Xem/Xyrs

Xe work for the state.
I work with **Xem**.
That computer is Xyrs.

Pronoun Tips


Pronouns are **not** preferred.

Pronouns **do not** always correlate with a person's gender identity or presentation.

Presentation **does not** indicate pronouns *or* gender identity.

Messing Up Pronouns

Step 1: Apologize




I'm so sorry, I
meant THEY
are next.

Step 2: Move on



Let me get
you that form.

Step 3: Practice



They need a form
I will get it for them.
Their form is complete.

Not Knowing Someone's Pronouns

When you are unsure of someone's pronouns you can:

- use their name instead of pronouns
- use another word to describe the person like "customer" or "client"
- use gender-neutral pronouns such as they/them/theirs
- provide your pronouns to create a welcoming space for others to share theirs if they are comfortable
