## Ella Baker



Among the many notable people in Black History is Ella Baker. Ms. Baker was a pioneer of the civil rights movement in the South. She held key roles in the NAACP, MLK's Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. She believed in grassroots organization and that oppressed peoples can advocate for themselves.

She recruited people to join the movement, raised money, and started chapters of the NAACP all over the South. She believed more in the power of the people in the field putting in the hard work to enact change than the leadership leading them. Above all, she respected the people she encountered, which helped her in all aspects of her work.

Ms. Baker was the first staff person hired for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, where she worked diligently to increase Black American voter turnout. She saw the potential of university students in the civil rights movement and helped form the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. The SNCC was divided into two parts: one for direct action and the other for voter registration. As one of the adult advisors of SNCC, she was called the "godmother of SNCC."

Ella Baker remained an activist through her life, up until her death at the age of 83.
