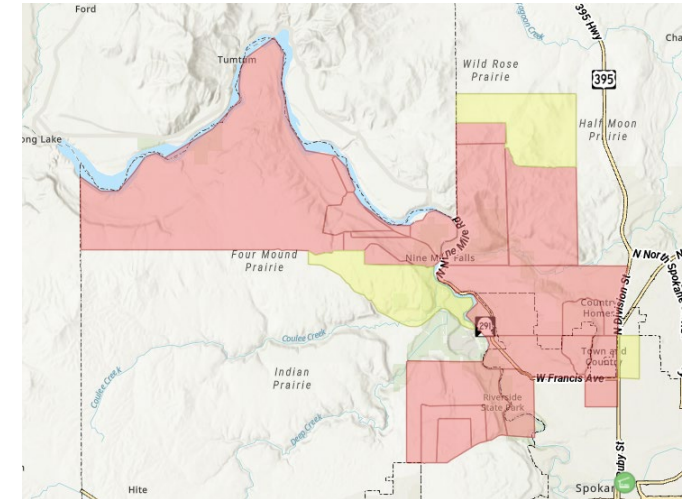

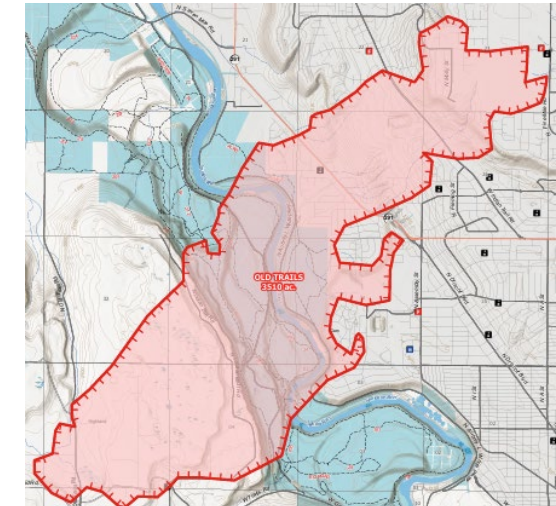

Evacuation Zones for the Old Trails and Autumn Fire as of 8/2/26

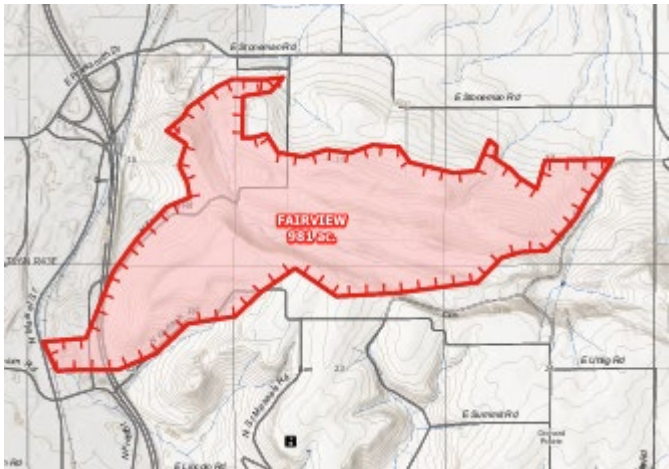


Fire Perimeter for the Old Trails Fire as of 8/2/26

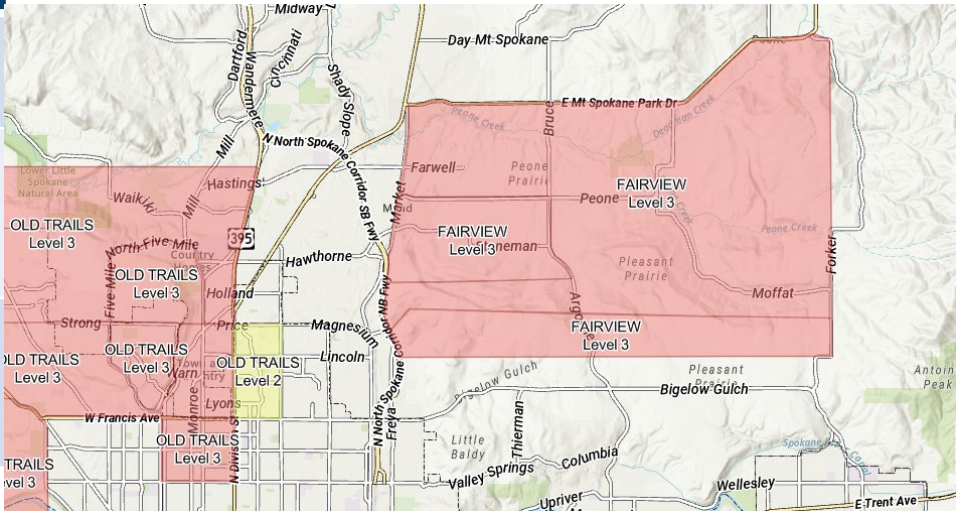

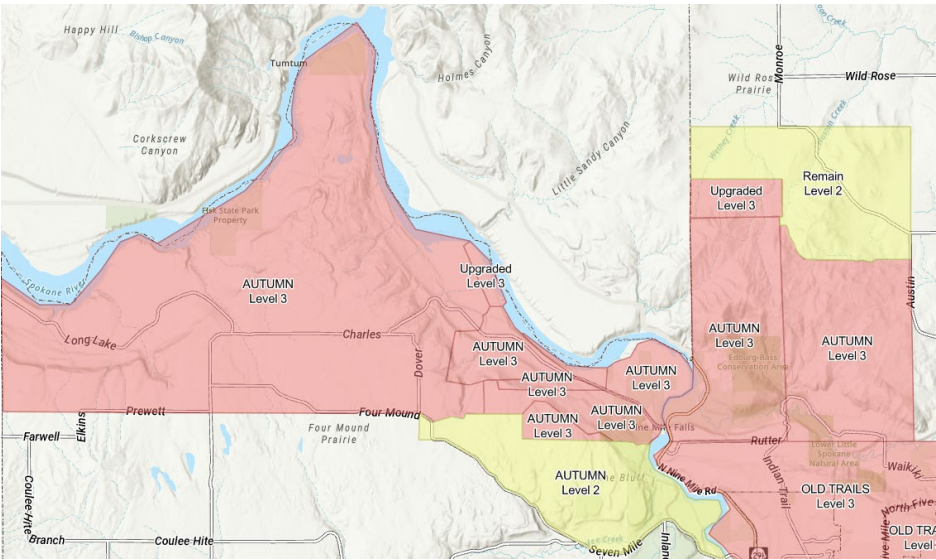

Current Situation

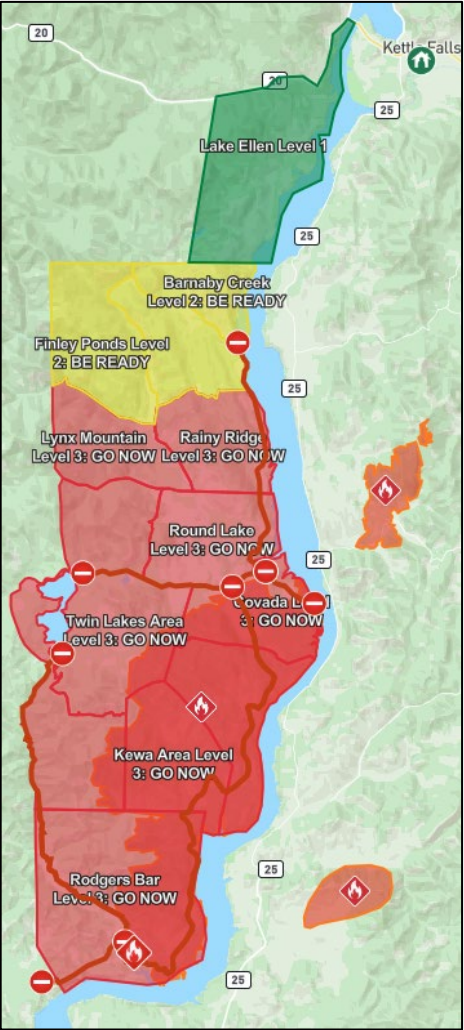
The Modrite Fire in Ferry county is currently at **49, 895** acres. It is 19% contained. Gusty winds, warm temperatures and low relative humidity will contribute to rapid fire spread as a strong cold front sweeps across the Inland Northwest today. The potential for long range spotting could lead to a run of six to seven miles north today. Point protection will remain the focus: structure preparation, constructing line, load-drops of retardant, monitoring. A heavy smoke inversion over the fire reduced fire behavior yesterday.

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26-2722 KAISER CANYON FIRE– CONFEDERATED TRIBES OF THE COLVILLE RESERVATION /OKANOGAN COUNTY

Current Situation

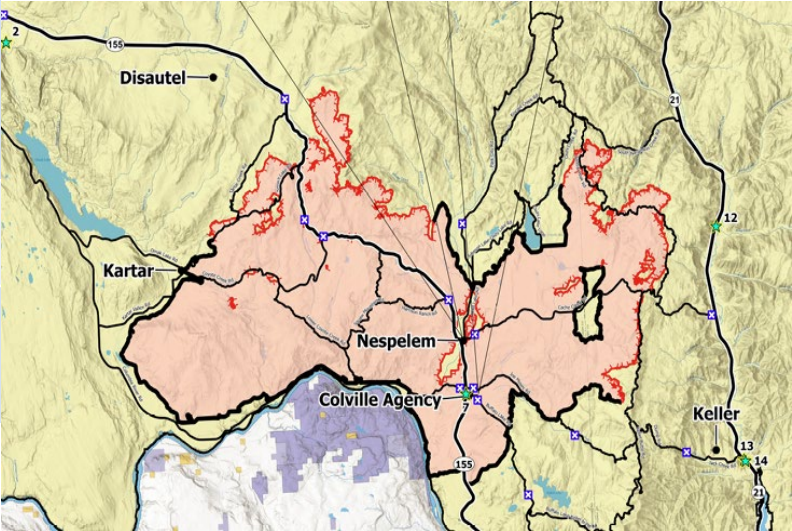
The Kaiser Canyon Fire started 07/16/2026. It is currently at **134, 413** acres and is 38% contained. Structure protection remains a top priority along Highways 21, 155, and toward the Kartar and Disautel communities. During the morning hours, crews are checking containment lines, securing previous days’ gains and preparing to respond to anything new during the wind event. Firefighting resources are being staged strategically across the fire to be available for rapid response to new ignitions and fire containment. Today brings the highest fire danger that has been experienced during the entirety of the Kaiser Canyon Fire. Southwesterly winds will increase through the morning, reaching a sustained 20-30 mph by midday Saturday. During the ‘potentially dangerous situation’ window this afternoon and evening, expect these winds to reach 20 to 30 mph fire-wide, with localized gusts of 40 to 50 mph. Wind directions will shift more westerly and northwesterly along the western perimeter of the fire in the early evening before beginning to ease after approximately 11 PM.

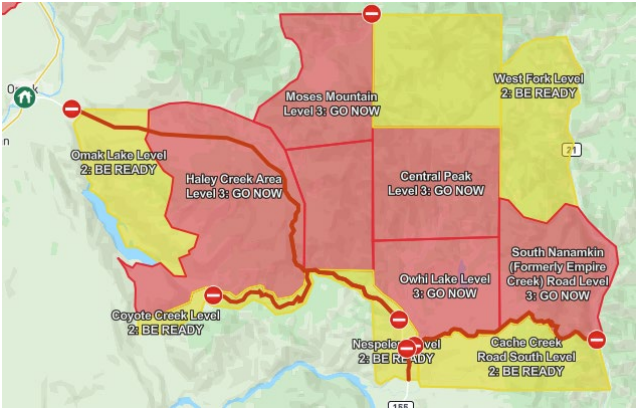

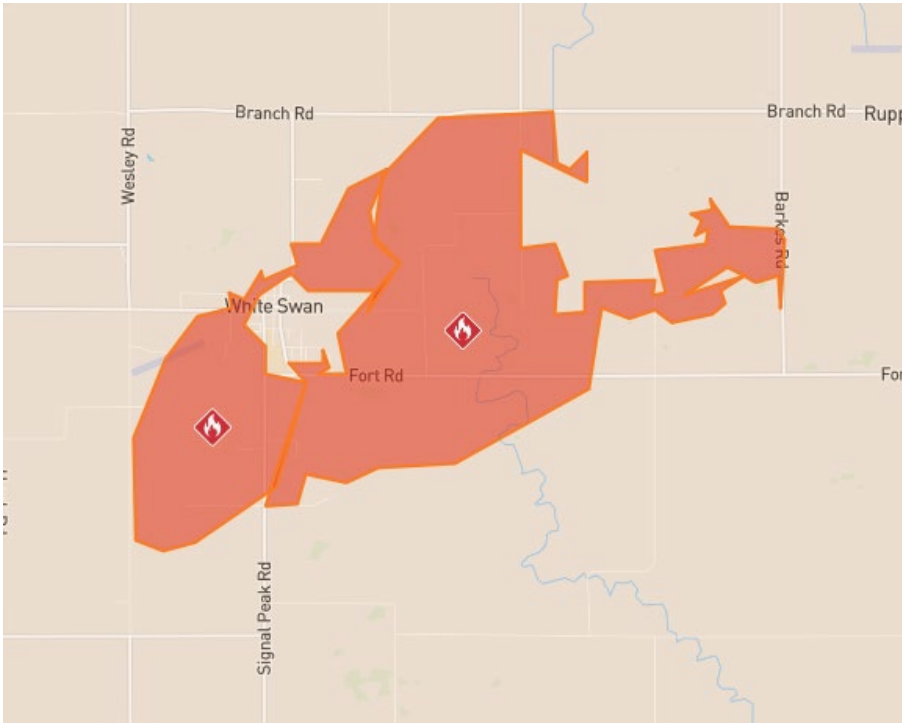

Current Situation					
The Signal Peak and Ransier Fires are both in the Confederated Tribes and Bands of the Yakama Nation area near White Swan. Merged, these two fires total 3,802 acres at 75% containment. The city of White Swan lost all telephone and power utility infrastructure, which is impacting the flow of information to include updated incident maps. Level 1 evacuations remain in place.

Current Situation

The Sinlahekin Fire started on 07/26/2026 around 1430. It is currently at **73, 794** acres and 0% contained. A State Fire Mobilization was approved on 07/29 and remains open at this time. The fire showed moderate activity throughout yesterday. Around 7:00 last night, fire behavior increased significantly in the Toats Coulee area on the north side and around Toby's Mill Road to the south. The fire continued to back down the hill above Loomis throughout the day. Crews worked into the evening to contain a spot fire across a dozer line near Toby's Mill Road. Firefighters conducted a successful burn operation at Horse Springs Coulee. Structure preparation and protection operations continued along Lemanasky Road and in and around Loomis.

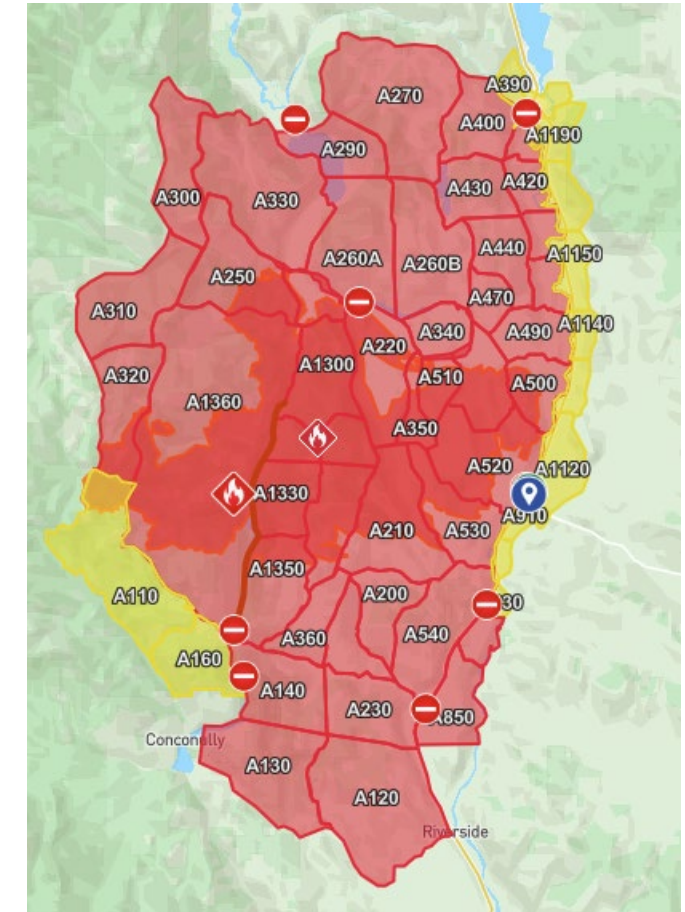

LITTLE GIANT FIRE – CHELAN COUNTY

Current Situation

The Little Giant Fire started on 07/15/2026 around 1817. It is currently at **38, 530** acres and 0% contained. Yesterday, smoke repressed fire activity in the morning for a third day in a row on the Little Giant Fire. Once the smoke lifted, helicopters worked on the east side of the fire until smoke conditions became too smoky to fly once again. However, aircraft was able to confirm that the fire had reached Duncan Hill. Crews worked to improve roads from Lake Creek to Shady Pass, Shady Pass across to Handy Springs, south to Devil’s Backbone, and into Timber Deck. Two hotshot crews are working in this area to clear the vegetation and find places to engage the fire directly. On the west side of the fire, crews are working to build contingency (back up) lines near the Pole Ridge fuel break. Structure protection groups continue to access properties. In anticipation of the winds, crews are working to prepare the primary fire containment line near Shady Pass and out to Lake Chelan to slow the fire’s progression to the south and southeast. They are also prioritizing the construction of primary line in the Tyee Ridge system to Mosquito Ridge toward west to tie back into Maverick Saddle.

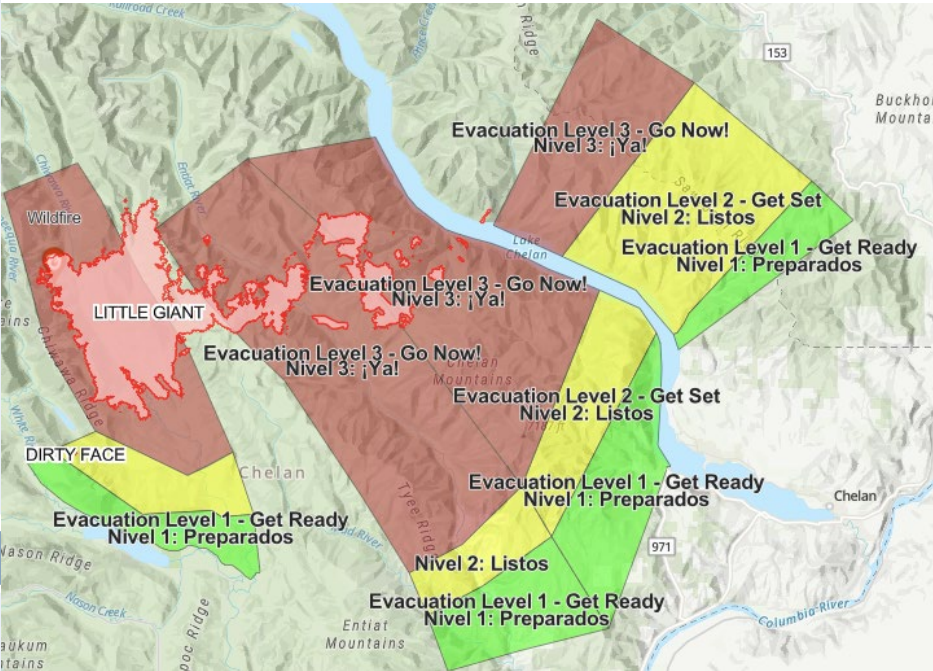

BRADEEN HILL FIRE – STEVENS COUNTY

Current Situation

The Bradeen Hill Fire started on 07/25/2026 and is currently at **4,212** acres and 7% containment. Today, firefighters will continue securing the fire’s edge around the perimeter in preparation for this afternoon’s expected winds. Spot fires around Deadman Hill remain a concern, with dozers and crews staying in the area to construct containment lines and suppress spots. The fire’s interior has largely cooled, aside from a few pockets of heavy fuels that continue to burn. Firefighters have been conducting structure protection measures around primary residences to create defensible space if the fire reaches them. These efforts include removing vegetation and other fuels near structures, applying water through helicopter bucket drops and hose lays, and constructing dozer and hand lines. Protection efforts have been concentrated along the fire’s western edge, where fire has the potential to spread rapidly if it moves down the west-facing slope toward Lake Roosevelt and into light, fine fuels such as grass. In contrast, the terrain on the fire’s northeastern edge is cooler and retains more moisture due to reduced exposure to lake winds and increased shade, making significant fire growth less likely in that area. Air resources will be assisting if conditions allow, including two type 1 Cougars and a helicopter coordination unit. Visibility and wind may restrict air operations today.

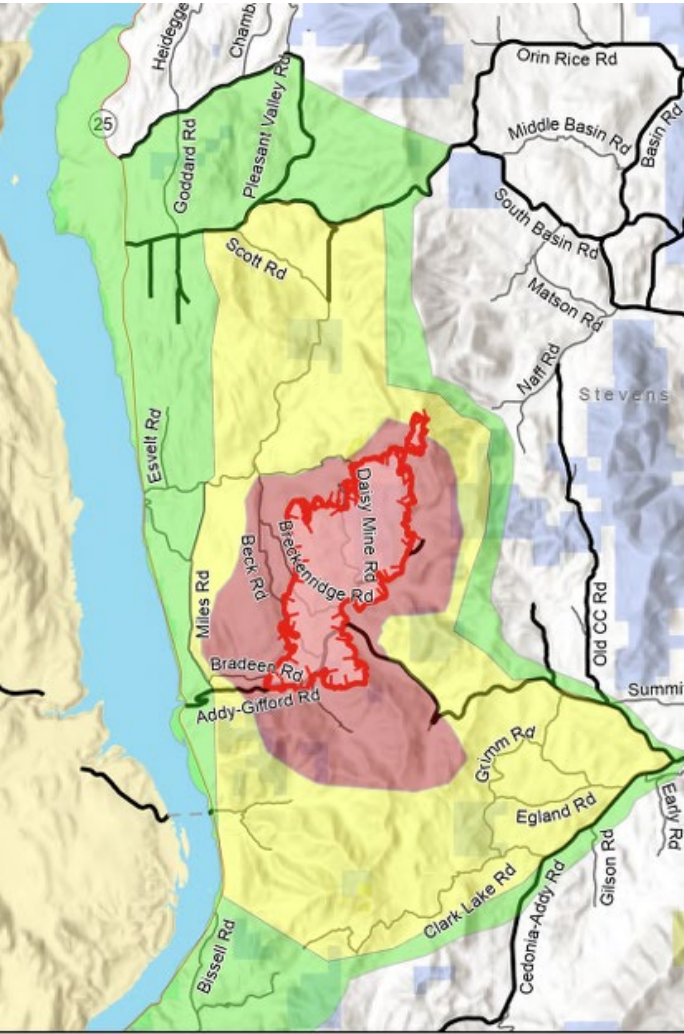

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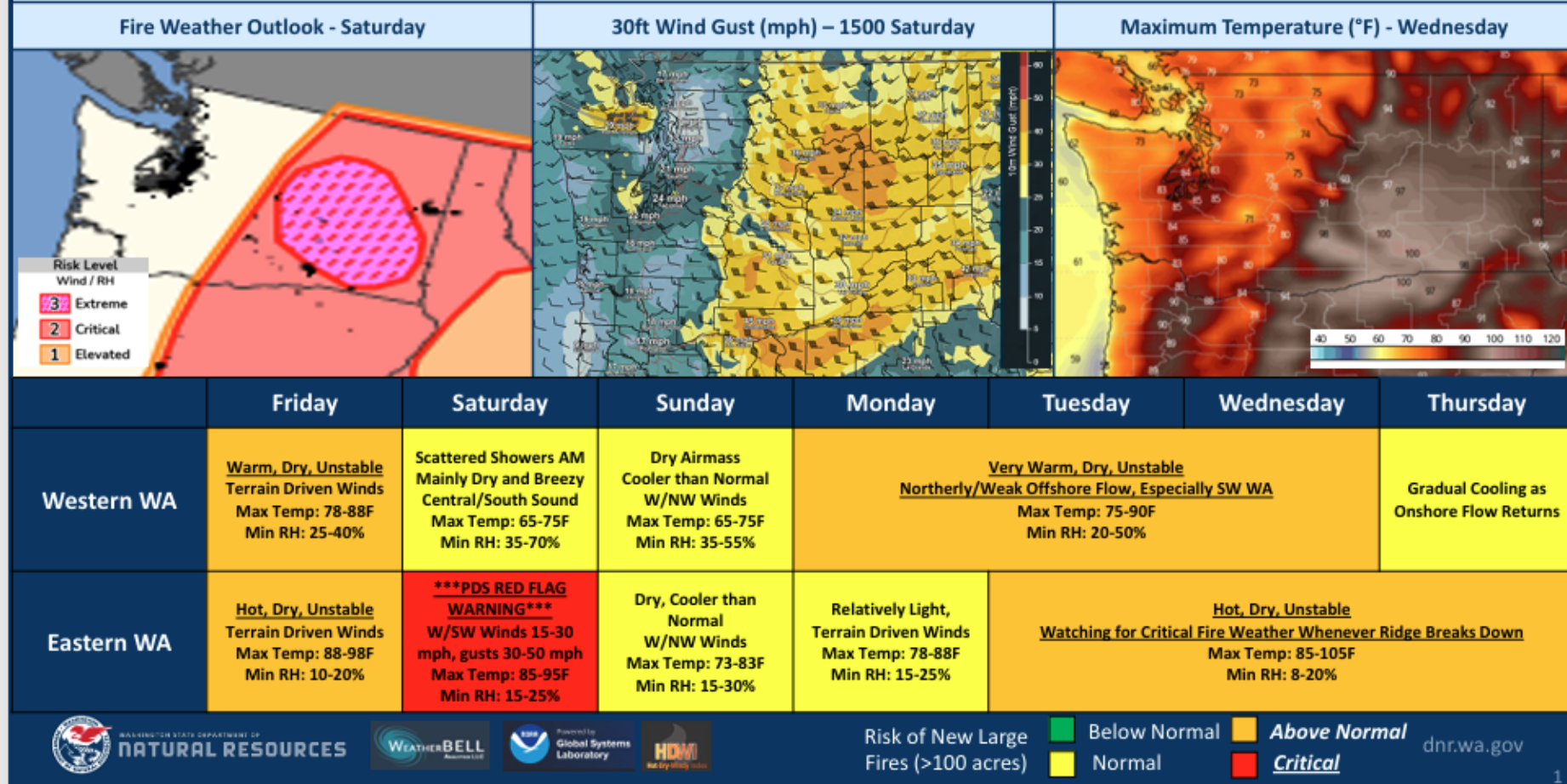

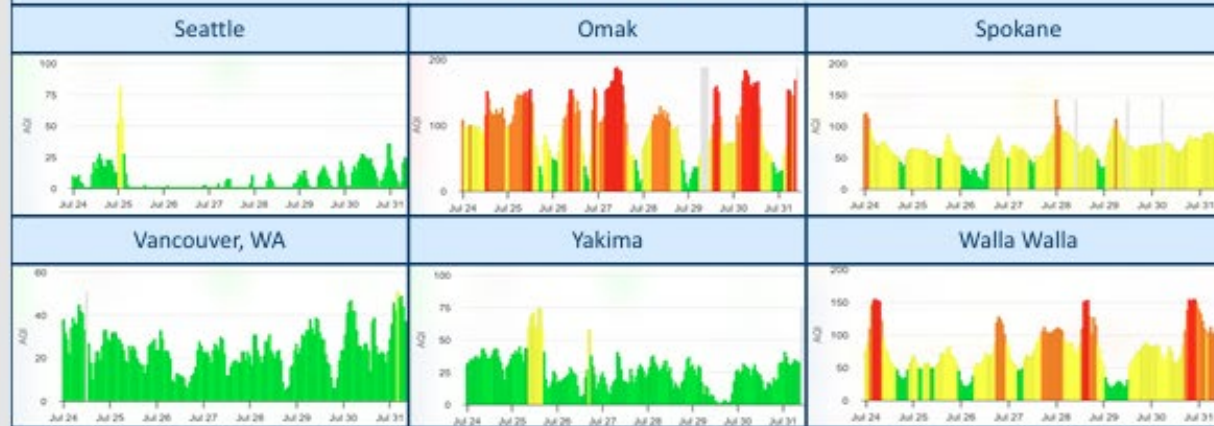

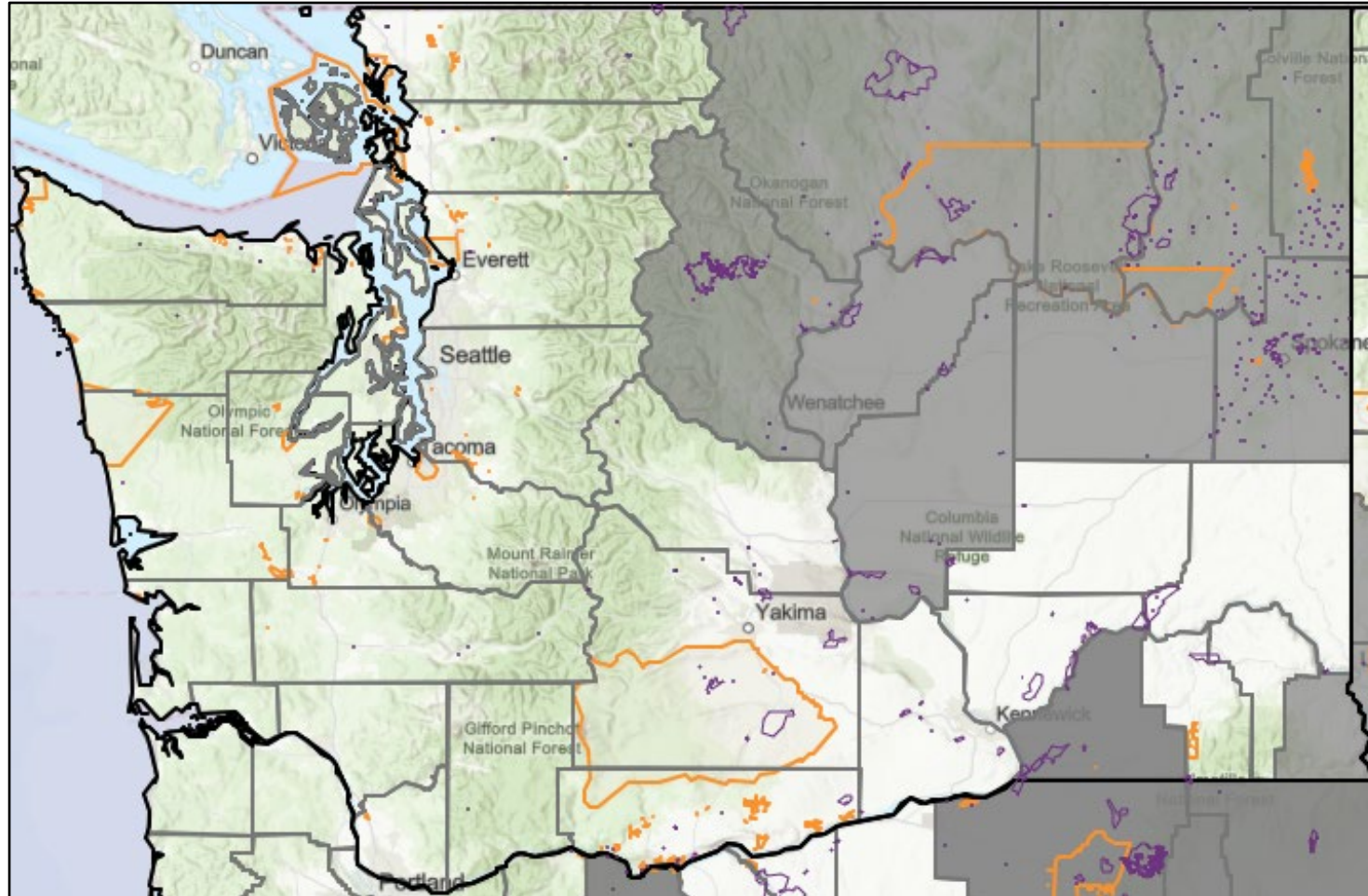

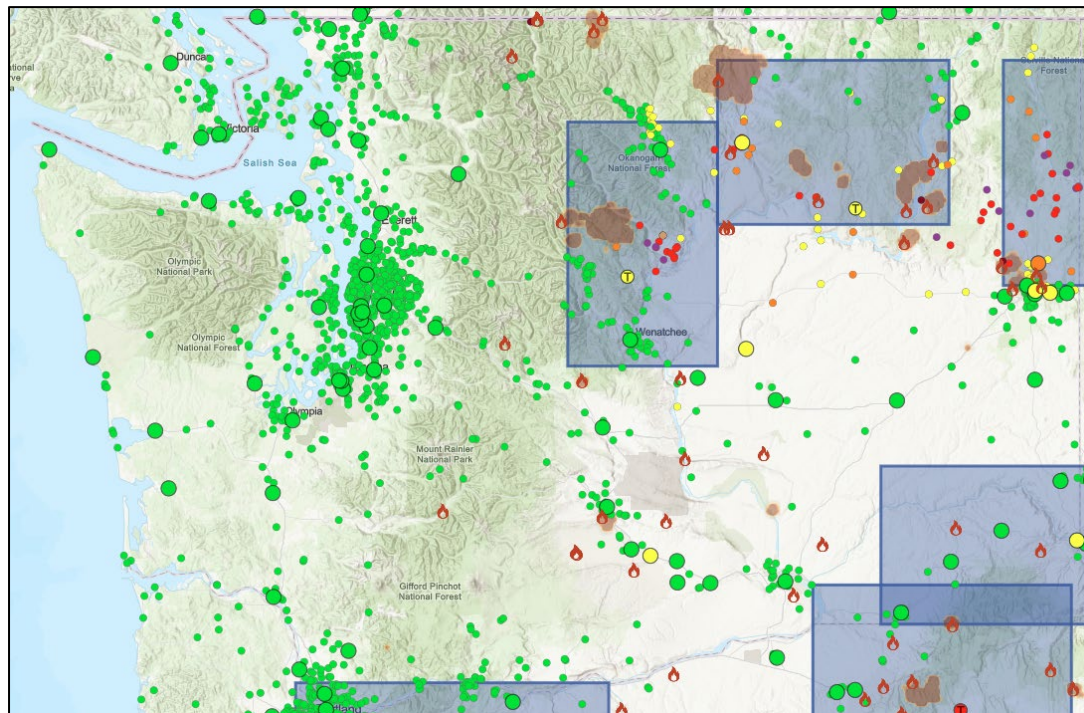
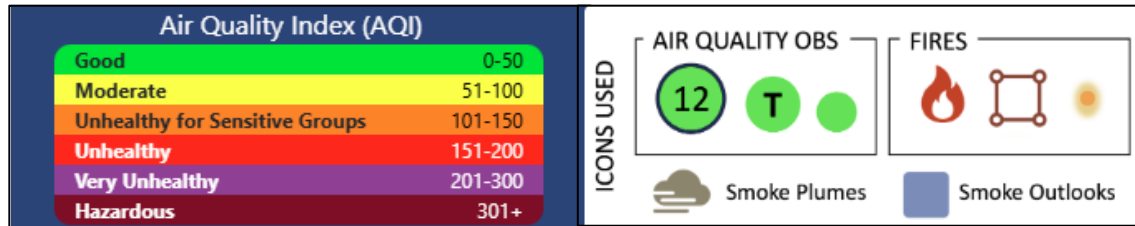
