2020 Virtual Veterans Day Ideas and Resources

Introduction

These ideas and online resources are provided to help schools meet the legislative requirements of <u>RCW 28A.230.160</u> while in a virtual learning environment. <u>RCW 28A.230.160</u> states:

"During the school week preceding the eleventh day of November of each year, there shall be presented in each common school as defined in RCW <u>28A.150.020</u> educational activities suitable to the observance of Veterans' Day.

The responsibility for the preparation and presentation of the activities approximating at least sixty minutes total throughout the week shall be with the principal or head teacher of each school building and such program shall embrace topics tending to instill a loyalty and devotion to the institutions and laws of this state and nation.

The superintendent of public instruction and each educational service district superintendent, by advice and suggestion, shall aid in the preparation of these activities if such aid be solicited."

To support schools engaged in remote or hybrid learning, the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction has developed sample lessons appropriate for use outside the traditional classroom structure. These lessons are provided for Elementary, Middle, and High School; however, educators are welcome to adapt any of these lessons they deem appropriate for use in their classroom.



Virtual Veterans Day Ideas by Grade Band

Grades K-5

- Video Introduction:
 - o All About the Holidays: Veterans Day from PBS Learning Media (1:16)
- Class Discussion:
 - O What is a veteran?
 - o What do veterans do?
 - o Do you know any veterans?
- Class Brainstorm:
 - o What are some characteristics of a veteran?
 - Examples: brave, smart, strong, selfless, loyal
 - Encourage students to consider veterans they know (family, community, etc.) when brainstorming characteristics of a veteran.
- Individual Activity:
 - o Giving a medal is one way the military thanks a veteran for helping our country.
 - o Show students one or more examples of military medals (see below).
 - Optional: Identify the parts of the medal and explain the symbolism.
 - Students choose a characteristic of veterans (brave, smart, selfless, etc.) and design a medal to honor veterans who show that characteristic.
 - Students may share their drawings with the class and explain what characteristic a veteran would need to show to be awarded this medal.
