## **Complaint File: Special Education Discipline Procedures**

**Summary**: In a recent special education community complaint investigation OSPI looked at whether a district followed special education discipline procedures. Specifically, whether a series of removals constituted a change in placement, requiring a manifestation determination meeting. The investigation showed the student had been suspended for a total of 17 days between September and March, based on six behavioral incidents.

**Analysis**: Initially, the student was emergency expelled, which represented an open-ended disciplinary removal with a likelihood of the removal being over 10 consecutive school days. A manifestation determination meeting was required and properly held, the discipline converted to a 10-day suspension, and the student was returned to his placement.

A change in placement via discipline can also occur when a student is subjected to a series of removals that constitute a pattern. The investigation in this complaint showed the student, following the 10-day suspension in September, was suspended several more times, totaling 7 additional days. None of these suspensions resulted in a manifestation determination meeting.

OSPI found that the district's analysis into the student's removals failed to address whether this constituted a series of removals. A pattern of removals occurs when 1) the removals total more than 10 school days in a school year, 2) the student's behavior is substantially similar to previous incidents that resulted in removals, and 3) additional factors, such as the length of each removal, the total amount of time the student is removed, and the proximity of the removals to one another. A district should consider all disciplinary exclusions in a school year, even when a prior manifestation determination has occurred—a previous manifestation determination in a school year does not mean that the earlier removals should not be considered when determining if there was a pattern. A district must analyze each removal to determine if it is a change in placement or part of a pattern/series of removals constituting a change in placement.

In the complaint investigation, OSPI found the student's removals subsequent to the 10-day suspension were all for behaviors that were substantially similar, and the removals were close in proximity. OSPI found the district should have conducted a second manifestation determination.
