


Lifting Up American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) Students

A Special Duty to AI/AN Students

Al/AN students hold a unique legal status as both U.S. citizens and members of sovereign tribes. As a result of this status, Washington has a special duty to educate these students under both the state constitution and under treaty, yet Al/AN students experience persistent and long-standing opportunity gaps in Washington's K–12 education system.



The Solution

The Problem

Washington must urgently address the deep systemic issues that drive inequitable educational outcomes for its Al/AN students. Strategies must include continued progress in state policy paired with sustained funding to create lasting and enduring change.

Invest in district-level programs and practices that support Native student success through a state match of the federal Title VI grant.

Cost: \$6.066,000 in FY26 \$12,121,000 in the 25–27 Biennium

About This Decision Package

Public education has historically been used as a tool of colonization, and despite recent state policy advances, this dark history of intergenerational trauma and a deep mistrust of the system continues to drive persistent inequitable educational outcomes for Al/AN students. As another step toward righting a longstanding historical wrong, the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) requests funding to match the federal investment in Al/AN students through Title VI.
