Nakia Academy Launches First Indigenous Educator Cohort in Partnership with the Office of Native Education

Dear Office of Native Education (ONE) Community & Affiliates,

On Saturday, October 25, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., something remarkable happened. Nakia Academy launched its first-ever Indigenous Educator Cohort — a vibrant, intentional space for Indigenous educators to gather in community, mentorship, and leadership.

This new cohort represents a historic step in Nakia's journey, fulfilling the spirit and purpose of RCW 28A.300.105, which directs the Office of Native Education to strengthen recruitment, retention, and professional development for American Indian and Alaska Native educators. By centering Indigenous knowledge and mentoring, this cohort advances culturally responsive education and honors sovereignty, language, and community.

About Nakia Academy

Nakia Academy is a coaching, mentoring, and leadership academy that prepares mentors and coaches who support beginning educators. It is a professional learning community by and for educators of color, created in partnership with the Washington Education Association (WEA), the Beginning Educator Support Team (BEST) at OSPI, the Washington School Counselor Association (WSCA), and now the Office of Native Education (ONE) at OSPI.

Since 2020, Nakia has supported over a thousand educators across Washington through five unique cohorts — three BIPOC educator cohorts, one for school counselors, and now one for Indigenous educators. Participants engage in the equivalent of BEST Mentor Academy 101 and 201 content, earn 24 equity clock hours, receive a \$500 honorarium upon completion, and remain connected through ongoing learning opportunities with BEST, WEA, WSCA, and ONE.

This new Indigenous Educator cohort with ONE is especially meaningful because of Annette Woolley's leadership as a Nakia alum, Indigenous educator, and scholar in the UW Tacoma–Muckleshoot Doctoral Cohort. Annette (Yakama and Swinomish) curated the Nakia curriculum specifically for Indigenous educators, centering Indigenous Ways of Knowing — weaving in story, reflection, and pedagogy that honor the lived experiences of Native educators, past and present, while holding space for those yet to come. Her vision, leadership, and heart ensured the launch was grounded, authentic, and community-driven.
