Invent 2 Prevent

STUDENTS INVENT2PREVENT (I2P) VIOLENCE

Expanding the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's I2P university initiative to now include 25+ high schools.

What is it?

High school students in a class, club, or independent study create dynamic projects through project-based learning to counter targeted violence and hate by developing localized strategies that leverage peer influence.

Rationale

Effective recruiting and pandemic-related grievances have accelerated targeted violence and terrorism throughout the country. We need to engage young people early to discover novel solutions to the problem.

Objective

To create and implement social and digital media campaigns, products, or tools that empower students to become involved in preventing targeted violence and hate in their schools and communities.

How It Works

Academic partnership model in action



An invitation is extended to 25 high schools challenging a team of students to organize into a functioning agency and design and implement a customized campaign.

Students conduct research and design their strategy based on I2P program-focused objectives.


Students test, validate, and revise their strategies. Then, they present their plan and take the unique step of activating campaigns in their communities.

Teams submit their campaigns and results for judging.

Top teams present in Washington, D.C. and compete for \$5,000, \$3,000 and \$1,000 awards. Interested seniors are encouraged to apply for \$1,000 scholarship award opportunities.
