- Robert Smith was in his late teens when he knowingly possessed controlled substance waste. Now, almost two decades later, Smith has maintained steady employment and is an active member of his community. The District Attorney's Office also supports his pardon.
- Steven Stadler was in his late teens when he committed burglary and theft. Now, over two decades later, Stadler has earned an HSED and started a business.
- Daniel Talbot was in his late 20s when he failed to report to jail. Now, over two decades later, Talbot has earned a vocational certification and has maintained steady employment.
- Robert Talley was in his early 20s when he failed to purchase a tax stamp and was in his late twenties when he was found in possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance. Now, almost two decades later, Talley has completed vocational training and is an active member of his community. The District Attorney's Office also supports his pardon.
- Jackie Utecht was in her early 20s when she participated in a burglary and theft and when she committed welfare fraud. Now, over three decades later, Utecht has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Anthony Walsh was in his early 20s when he harbored and aided a felon and was found in possession of a firearm in violation of the terms of his bail. Now, over two decades later, Walsh owns a business and has shown positive adjustment.
- Monique West was in her mid-20s when she was found in possession of a controlled substance and to be maintaining a place for the sale of controlled substances. Now, over a decade later, West has earned a GED and has shown personal growth. The District Attorney's Office also supports her pardon.
- Scott Wollinka was in his late teens when he committed theft. Now, more than 50 years later, Wollinka has earned professional licensure and retired after a long career.
