- Ronald Balgord was in his late teens when he and another individual broke into buildings and several vehicles and stole property. Now, over three decades later, Balgord has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Court supports his pardon.
- Andrew Barsamian was in his late teens when he broke into several warehouses and buildings and was also in possession of a firearm. Now, over three decades later, Barsamian earned an associate degree in marketing, obtained a certificate in small business management, and is an active volunteer and member in his community.
- Amanda Clark stole and cashed her employer's company check. Now, nearly two decades later, Clark obtained certifications related to housing renovation and education, earned various awards related to her work in the community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The District Attorney's Office supports her pardon.
- Theodore Clarke was in his late teens when he entered a college dormitory and forged and cashed multiple checks and stole various other items, including a credit card. Now, over two decades later, Clarke obtained an associate degree in accounting and volunteers for social services and anti-hunger nonprofit organizations. The Court supports his pardon.
- Jerry Doleshal sold a controlled substance. Now, over two decades later, Doleshal earned a commercial driver's license (CDL) and tanker endorsement and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Christy Fields wrote checks while knowingly overdrawing on the accounts. Now, over two decades later, Fields is a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA), obtained a CDL and forklift certification, is an active volunteer and member in her community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Court and the District Attorney's Office support her pardon.
- Zachary Fischer was in his late teens when he was found to be in possession of marijuana. Now, over two decades later, Fischer earned his General Educational Development (GED) and technical diploma, completed employment-related training and certifications, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Court supports his pardon.
- Shauntia Hale stole money from her employer. Now, three decades later, Hale earned an associate degree in accounting, obtained a CNA license, and completed employment-related training and certifications.
- Christopher Jennings and another individual sold controlled substances to a confidential informant. Now, over a decade later, Jennings earned employment-related certifications, completed college coursework, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Carrie Lathan cashed forged checks and later opened checking accounts under a different individual's name. Now, nearly two decades later, Lathan earned a CNA license, has completed continuing education coursework, and is an active volunteer and member of her community.
- Jake Lewallen ran from an officer while being booked for a violation of his probation. Now, over two decades later, Lewallen earned a GED, obtained a CDL with additional endorsements, volunteers to support communities impacted by natural disasters, and is an active member of his community. The Court supports his pardon, and Lewallen received

robust support from friends, family, and community members who attest to his moral character.

- Jerry Morris drove and fled from officers at a high rate of speed and later was found in possession of marijuana and a controlled substance. Later, Morris was found again in possession of a controlled substance. Now, over two decades later, Morris obtained associate and bachelor's degrees in human services, is an active volunteer and member of his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Court supports his pardon.
- David Nash entered a building and residences and stole various items. Now, over two decades later, Nash volunteers at food pantries, is an active member of his church, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Court and District Attorney's Office support his pardon, as well as one of the victims.
- Gary Pagel was found to be in possession of marijuana, and later, he was discovered to be in possession of, selling, and delivering marijuana to multiple locations. Now, over two decades later, Pagel obtained a High School Equivalency Diploma (HSED) and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Capri Parrett was in his late teens when he was found to be in possession of a controlled substance and later did not return while on probation. Later, Parrett fled custody and was found in possession of a controlled substance. Now, nearly two decades later, Parrett earned an associate degree, completed employment-related training and certifications, is an active volunteer in his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Jeffrey Peters was in his late teens when he broke into a school and stole tools, using them to steal batteries from vehicles in the parking lot. Later, Peters was found to be in possession of a firearm and, over a decade later, failed to provide child support. Now, nearly three decades later, Peters is an active member of his community. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Adam Raymond was in his late teens when he and other individuals broke into multiple buildings and stole various items. Now, over two decades later, Raymond obtained a Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) contractor license and is an active volunteer in his community. The Court supports his pardon.
- Lynette Rodgers failed to report her income and received excess public assistance benefits. Now, four decades later, Rodgers has maintained employment in a public school system. The Court supports her pardon.
- Tony Spencer was in his late teens when he and another individual stole and drove a vehicle before fleeing from officers. Now, over three decades later, Spencer earned an HSED, obtained a Federal Railroad Administration engineer certificate, completed a carpenter apprenticeship, completed college coursework, is an active volunteer and member in his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Roy Splingaire was in his late teens when he and other individuals broke into multiple businesses and stole merchandise. Now, over four decades later, Splingaire started a business and is an active member of his community.
- Micah Sprewer was in his late teens when he took and operated a vehicle and later fled from officers. Now, over two decades later, the Court and the victim support his pardon.
- Arturo Vazquez sold marijuana to a confidential informant. Now, nearly two decades later, Vazquez completed coursework in welding and emergency response disaster

training, obtained a CPR certification and a forklift license, started a business, and is an active member in his community.

- Robert Williams was in his late teens when he and another individual threatened to take money from other individuals with a firearm. Now, nearly two decades later, Williams volunteers with a nonprofit organization serving unhoused individuals and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Lakesha Barnes stole money from the bank she worked at. Now, more than two decades later, Barnes earned her associate degree in early childhood education, started a business, and is a regular volunteer in her community. The Court and District Attorney support her pardon.
- Daniel Bins was in his late teens when he and another individual took multiple snowmobiles and a trailer. Now, almost three decades later, Bins obtained his CDL, volunteers to protect animals and is an active member of his community and received an award for preventing a home invasion in his community.
- Adrian Brown was found to be in illegal possession of a firearm during a traffic stop. Now, two decades later, Brown has obtained multiple employment-related certifications, enrolled in an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) certification, and mentors youth. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Tamara Conner forged a check and attempted to cash it. Now, almost three decades later, Connor has earned her GED, became a certified nursing assistant, earned a medical assistant degree, obtained various employment-related certifications, regularly volunteers with a violence intervention organization, and is an active member of her community. The Court and District Attorney's Office support her pardon.
- Mindy DeGrand was in her late teens when she and three other individuals attempted to cash stolen checks. Now, over two decades later, DeGrand has obtained her HSED, earned an associate degree in veterinary technology, volunteers with animals, and is an active member of her community.
- Clarissa Hopson was found to be illegally possessing a firearm. Now, almost two decades later, Hopson obtained her CNA license, is currently pursuing her Registered Nurse (RN) license, is an active member of her community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The District Attorney's Office supports her pardon.
- Nicole Kirchner was in her late teens when she and four other individuals engaged in a forgery scheme. Now, over two decades later, Kirchner has obtained multiple employment-related licenses, earned her associate degree in paralegal studies, is an active member of her community, and has shown positive adjustment. The District Attorney's Office supports her pardon.
- Daniel Lentz was the driver of three individuals who stole merchandise from a store. Later, Lentz and another individual stole more merchandise from a store. Now, over a decade later, Lentz has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Gregory Marks was in his late teens when he and another individual caused damage to a storage unit by spray-painting it without the owner's consent. Now, over two decades later, Marks graduated from high school, opened numerous restaurants, and is an active volunteer in his community. The Court supports his pardon.
- Tamra Oman forged multiple checks to steal merchandise. Oman also directly stole from her employer and later used other identities to forge additional checks. Now, over two decades later, Oman has shown great personal growth and positive adjustment, is a

member of multiple public interest committees, is an active volunteer in her community, became a published author, and received a public service award.

- Joseph Pape was in his teens when he entered a residence without permission and stole various items. Now, nearly three decades later, Pape obtained his HSED, became a licensed foster parent, and is an active member of his community. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Laura Perez stole from customer accounts at the bank she worked at. Now, over two decades later, Perez has started a business, volunteers with multiple organizations, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Petria Reliford was in her teens when she set fire to a friend's clothes after a dispute, which caused damage to a building. Now, over three decades later, Reliford obtained a high school diploma, became a CNA, completed multiple employment-related trainings and certifications, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The District Attorney's Office supports her pardon.
- Austin Rentsch was in his late teens and early 20s when he was involved in a conspiracy to sell marijuana. Now, over two decades later, Rentsch earned an associate degree, obtained a bachelor's degree in accounting, earned a master's degree in business administration, regularly volunteers in his community, and has shown positive adjustment and personal growth.
- Holly Roeser and another individual wrote forged checks and made multiple retail purchases. Now, over three and a half decades later, Roeser obtained her GED, completed coursework towards an associate degree, volunteers in her community, and has shown positive adjustment and personal growth.
- Cary Romanowski was in his teens when he and several individuals broke into multiple vehicles and stole various items, including a checkbook, and wrote out a false check. Now, over three and a half decades later, Romanowski has completed numerous employment-related certifications, volunteers in his community, and has shown positive adjustment.
- Paul Scafe was in his late teens driving several individuals in his car when he caused significant property damage. Now, over three decades later, Scafe is a regular volunteer in his community and has shown positive adjustment and personal growth.
- Danna Stokes failed to report income and received an excess of public assistance benefits. Later, Stokes cashed a forged check. Now, over two decades later, Stokes is an active member of her community, volunteers at a food pantry, and has shown positive adjustment and personal growth. The District Attorney's Office supports her pardon.
- Rodney Street was in his early 20s when an officer attempted to conduct a traffic stop, and he failed to stop and fled his vehicle on foot. Now, over three decades later, Street is an active volunteer in his community, attended courses in audio engineering, and is currently pursuing an apprenticeship.
- Cindy Szymanski was in her late teens when she and other individuals burglarized a home. Now, almost four decades later, Szymanski obtained her HSED, earned an associate degree in medical transcription, obtained a CDL license, completed multiple employment-related trainings, and has displayed personal growth and positive readjustment.
- Latasha Triplett was in her late teens when she and two other individuals attempted to rob a man at his home. Later, Triplett set fire to a building and started an altercation with the

responding officer. After that, Triplett and another individual sold a controlled substance to an undercover officer and was found to be in possession of controlled substances.

Now, nearly two decades later, Triplett regularly volunteers in her community, obtained her CNA license and works as a healthcare provider, and has shown positive adjustment.

- Hai Vu and other individuals were found to have passed numerous counterfeit checks at multiple banks. Now, over two decades later, Vu has earned his GED, is an active member of his community, and has displayed positive adjustment and personal growth. Both the District Attorney's Office and the Court support his pardon.
- Gregory White was in his teens when he and other individuals attacked a victim and stole money. Later, White was discovered to be in possession of marijuana and, when approached by police, falsely identified himself. Now, nearly three decades later, White has shown personal growth and positive adjustment, is an active member of his community, and volunteers his time and services.
- Pheng Yang was in his teens when he and other individuals broke into vehicles to steal stereo equipment. Now, over two and a half decades later, Yang has obtained a GED, earned an associate degree in accounting, and is an active volunteer in his community.
- Heidi Dallapiazza knowingly made a false statement under oath while testifying in a deposition before a notary public. Now, nearly three decades later, Dallapiazza has pursued further employment-related training and certifications and is an active volunteer within her community.
- Jeffrey Dinkins was found to be in possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia used in the sale of drugs. Later, Dinkins was with another individual when they were found to be in possession of marijuana. Now, over two decades later, Dinkins has maintained employment and shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Correna Beamon was in her late teens when she was found to have marijuana, a controlled substance, and other drug paraphernalia in her shared residence. Now, over two decades later, Beamon has obtained an associate degree in environmental health and water quality, has pursued further employment-related training and certifications, and is an active volunteer within her community.
- Gregory Boyd was in his late teens when he and another individual were found to be in possession of a controlled substance and a firearm. Later, Boyd was found to be in possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of delivering. Now, over two decades later, Boyd has completed a barbering and cosmetology apprenticeship, is an active member within his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Courts support his pardon.
- Richard Buckner was found to be in possession of a controlled substance, marijuana, drug paraphernalia, and several firearms. Now, over a decade later, Buckner has completed an electrician apprenticeship, obtained carpenter and journeyman electrician licensures, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Court supports his pardon.
- Rodney Burdine was found to be in possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. Now, three decades later, Burdine has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Aaron Foss was found to be in possession of marijuana. Now, over two decades later, Foss has earned a bachelor's degree in health, human performance, and recreation, as well as a master's degree in clinical and mental health counseling, has mentored underprivileged youth in his community, and is an active member of his community.

- Gregory Fritzler was in his late teens when he was found to be in possession of marijuana and psilocybin mushrooms. Now, over two decades later, Fritzler has obtained two associate degrees, completed various employment-related trainings and certifications, is an active volunteer within his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Ryan Harvey sold a controlled substance to a confidential informant on two occasions. Now, over two decades later, Harvey has obtained a GED, is pursuing further professional development, volunteers as a youth basketball coach, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Tracey Hubbard sold a controlled substance to a confidential informant. Now, over three decades later, Hubbard has earned an associate degree as a medical assistant, obtained a CNA license, is an active member of her community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Jonathan Kussow was in his late teens when he failed to stop during a traffic stop and fled. Now, over two decades later, Kussow has obtained an HVAC certification, is an active member of his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Nathaniel LeMahieu was in his late teens when he shared a prescription medication with other individuals. Later, he was found consuming alcohol, a violation of his bail terms. Now, more than a decade later, LeMahieu has earned both a bachelor's and a master's degree in criminal justice, worked in the field of criminal justice reform, is an active member of his faith community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Justin Lockard and three other individuals sold marijuana to a confidential informant. Now, over two decades later, Lockard has pursued professional development, volunteers within his community, and is an active member within his faith community. The Court supports his pardon.
- Timothy Marx was found to be in possession of marijuana plants, growing equipment, and drug paraphernalia. Now, over three decades later, Marx earned an HSED, pursued professional development, has shown personal growth and positive adjustment, and is an active volunteer within the recovery community.
- August Meinerz was in his late teens when he drove a vehicle under the influence of prescription painkillers. Meinerz was also found to be in possession of marijuana, various prescription painkillers, and drug paraphernalia. Later, he sold a controlled substance to a confidential informant. Now, two decades later, Meinerz earned two bachelor's degrees in marketing and finance and is an active member of his community. The Court and community members support his pardon.
- Sharonda Morris failed to report income and received an excess of public assistance benefits. Now, four decades later, Morris earned an associate degree in nursing and phlebotomy, earned several certifications and licensures within the medical field, and is an active volunteer within her community.
- Joaquin Onate sold a controlled substance to someone on one occasion. Now, three decades later, Onate is an active member of his community, and the Court supports a pardon.
- Ryan Peterson was in his late teens when officers executed a search warrant on his shared residence and found marijuana and drug paraphernalia. Now, over two and a half decades later, Peterson has earned an associate degree in automotive technology, has pursued

further professional development, is an active member of his faith community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.

- Jorge Rivera Jr. was in his late teens when he sold marijuana to an undercover officer. Now, three decades later, Rivera started a business, obtained licenses related to his employment, and is an active member of his community.
- Mary Shields failed to report income and received an excess of public assistance benefits. Now, over three decades later, Shields has shown personal growth and positive adjustment and is an active member of her community. The Court supports her pardon.
- Richard Smoczynski sold prescription painkillers to an undercover officer. Now, two decades later, Smoczynski has shown personal growth and positive adjustment and is pursuing further professional and educational development. The Court supports his pardon.
- Peter Stark was found to be in possession of marijuana plants and drug paraphernalia. Now, three decades later, Stark has shown personal growth and positive adjustment and is an active member within his community.
- William Thomsen and another individual sold a controlled substance to a confidential informant. Now, over two decades later, Thomsen earned an HSED, a CDL, started several businesses, and volunteers in his community.
- Marshaun Williams was found to be in possession of marijuana. Now, over two decades later, Williams has sought educational development, is an active volunteer and member within his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Court supports his pardon.
- Denise Benton wrote fraudulent checks. Now, over three decades later, Benton has completed training related to her employment and is an active volunteer within her community. The Court supports her pardon.
- Martin Calderon drove his vehicle under the influence of alcohol, hitting a parked car. Now, over two decades later, Calderon is an active member of his church and was recognized by the Wisconsin State Legislature as a “Hometown Hero” for his work in the community. The District Attorney’s Office supports his pardon.
- Diane Douglas was in her late teens when she used force to commit a robbery, and in her 20s when she sold a controlled substance to an undercover officer on multiple occasions. Now, over two decades later, Douglas obtained a technical diploma in financial management, obtained an associate degree in human resources, obtained a CDL, completed employment-related training and certifications, and volunteers in her community. The District Attorney’s Office supports her pardon.
- William Dremel III was found in possession of marijuana and a controlled substance, and later, was found violating the conditions of his bond. Now, over a decade later, Dremel has started three businesses and volunteers for nonprofits that give toys to children.
- Tina Flood signed and cashed another individual’s paychecks without permission. Now, over two decades later, Flood obtained a CNA certification, completed employment-related training and certifications, and is an active member of her community.
- Robert Grainger was in his late teens when he entered a building and took property. Now, over four decades later, Grainger obtained his GED, obtained an associate degree in business management, completed employment-related training and certifications, and is an active member of his church. The Court supports his pardon.

- April Hough was in her late teens when she wrote and cashed checks without permission. Now, over two decades later, Hough obtained an associate degree, completed employment-related training and certifications, and is an active volunteer in her community. The District Attorney's Office supports her pardon.
- David Jacobs fled from an officer at a traffic stop. Now, nearly three decades later, Jacobs is an active volunteer within his community and received robust support from friends, family, and community members who attest to his moral character. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Jeffrey Knepper was in his late teens when he was found in possession of marijuana. Now, over two decades later, Knepper is an active member of his community. Knepper also received robust support from friends, family, and community members who attest to his moral character.
- Kendrick Miller was in his teens when he took property without permission while armed with a firearm. Now, over three decades later, Miller obtained his GED, obtained employment-related certificates, and is an active volunteer and member of his community. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Jose Nieves was found in possession of a controlled substance with an intent to deliver. Now, over three decades later, Nieves has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Michael Nowaczyk was found in possession of marijuana. Now, more than a decade later, Nowaczyk started a business, coached youth sports, volunteers at his children's school, and is an active member of his community. The Court supports his pardon.
- Clemente Salaz was in his late teens when he was found in possession of a controlled substance and a concealed weapon. Later, Salaz failed to stop for a traffic stop and fled from officers at a high rate of speed. Now, over a decade later, Salaz obtained a GED, started a business, coaches youth sports, and obtained employment- and parental-related trainings and certificates. The District Attorney supports his pardon.
- Timothy Schabo was in his late teens when he was found in possession of marijuana, maintained a place for the delivery of marijuana, and used threat of force to take property from a pharmacy. Later, Schabo caused harm to a minor. Today, Schabo has obtained a bachelor's degree in political science, spoke on criminal justice reform panels, helped draft legislation regarding criminal justice reform, coached youth football, started a church, and is an active volunteer and member of his community.
- Linda Senethavisouk was in her late teens when she forged another individual's signature and cashed their paycheck. Now, over two decades later, Senethavisouk obtained her GED and is an active volunteer within her community. The Court supports her pardon.
- Leroy Shields was in his late teens when he damaged and operated a vehicle without the owner's consent and later, was found in possession of marijuana. Shields was again later found in possession of marijuana and a controlled substance on separate occasions. Now, over three decades later, Shields obtained a high school diploma, obtained a technical diploma in custodial services, completed employment-related training and certificates, started a business, owns rental properties with his wife, and is an active volunteer and member of his community.
- Kenneth Sonnen entered a building and threatened an individual with a firearm to steal money. Now, over four decades later, Sonnen obtained a technical degree in plastics, an

associate degree and professional license, and is an active volunteer within his community. The Court and District Attorney's Office support his pardon.

- Robin Stevens was in his late teens when he entered several vehicles and garages and took property. Now, over a decade later, Stevens obtained a high school diploma, obtained an IT certificate, and volunteers at his child's school events and fundraisers.
- Traci Stewart operated a vehicle under the influence of a controlled substance with a minor in the vehicle, and later failed to report to jail after being convicted for the previously stated offense. Now, nearly two decades later, Stewart became a certified peer support specialist and recovery coach, started a business, coached youth sports, and is an active member and volunteer within the recovery community. Stewart received robust support from friends, family, and community members who attest to her moral character.
- Kenneth Walker maintained a place for the delivery of marijuana/controlled substances and later was found conspiring to possess with intent to deliver marijuana. Walker was later found manufacturing and delivering a controlled substance and conspiring to manufacture and deliver marijuana. Now, over a decade later, Walker obtained a professional license, owns a company, and coaches youth sports.
- LeCedric Ward was found in possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver and later was found in possession of a firearm. Now, over a decade later, Ward obtained a HSED, completed employment-related training and certifications, published a book, and is an active volunteer and member of his community. Ward received robust support from friends, family, and community members who attest to his moral character. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Khiem Wright attempted to set fire to a building. Now, nearly three decades later, Wright obtained a GED, completed employment-related training and certifications, and is an active volunteer within his community. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Devon Chambliss signed and cashed checks without permission. Now, over two decades later, Chambliss earned a GED, obtained an associate degree in human services, earned a bachelor's degree in human resources management, is an active volunteer in her community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The District Attorney's Office supports her pardon.
- Robert Fenske was in his late teens when he entered a service station and took cash without permission, and later he and two other individuals entered a business and stole cash, checks, and other property. Now, nearly six decades later, Fenske earned a GED and worked as a first responder. Fenske received robust support from family, friends, and members of his community who attest to his moral character. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Shawn Halter was in his late teens when he failed to stop for a traffic stop. Now, more than two decades later, Halter started a business and is an active volunteer and member of his community. His pardon received robust support from family, friends, and members of his community, including a retired law enforcement officer, who attest to his moral character.
- Eric James was in his teens when he took a vehicle and entered a store intending to take property. Later, James burglarized a residence, and later, stole money from his place of employment. James later sold a controlled substance to a confidential informant and was found conspiring to manufacture and deliver a controlled substance. Now, nearly three

decades later, James started two businesses, founded a nonprofit organization, received various awards for his community involvement, and is an active volunteer and member of his community.

- Juan Jauregui was in his late teens when he posted a picture on social media of himself in possession of a firearm. Now, nearly a decade later, Jauregui obtained a bachelor's degree in history and pre-law, is an active volunteer and member in his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. Jauregui received robust support from friends, family, and community members, who attest to his moral character. The Court and District Attorney's Office support his pardon.
- Jamail Joiner was in his late teens when he entered a residence and took property. Now, nearly two decades later, Joiner is an active volunteer within his community and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment, including providing care for members of his family and community. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Ellen Kluetzman stole prescribed medication. Now, more than two decades later, Kluetzman is an active volunteer, member, and leader in her church. Kluetzman received robust support from family, friends, and members of her community who attest to her moral character. The Court supports her pardon.
- John Laudolff was in his late teens when he took the property of three individuals. Now, more than three decades later, Laudolff completed employment-related training, obtained employment-related licenses, and is an active member of his personal and professional communities. Laudolff received robust support from family, friends, and members of his community who attest to his moral character. The Court supports his pardon.
- Jessica Le Tourneau delivered controlled substances to a drop site that was accessed by an individual who was incarcerated. Now, nearly one decade later, Le Tourneau became the co-owner of a business and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.

Now, more than two decades later, Moutry serves on a leadership council for a higher education institution and on the board of directors for a local youth family center. Trisler received support from a police sergeant in his community who attests to his moral character. The District Attorney's Office and the victim support his pardon.
- De'Anthony Walker was in his late teens when he failed to stop for a traffic stop. Now, more than two decades later, Walker earned a two-year technical degree in applied science, completed employment-related training and certifications, and volunteered in his community.
- Antoine Williams sold controlled substances to an officer and a confidential informant and later was found in possession of controlled substances and further offered some of these substances to his arresting officers in exchange for being let go. Now, more than two decades later, Williams is an active volunteer and member of his community. His pardon received support from a program coordinator of a criminal rehabilitation nonprofit organization.

- Anthony Brown was in his late teens when he was found in possession of a short-barrel shotgun and later was found storing marijuana at the residence of an individual that he knew. Now, more than two decades later, Brown obtained a GED, pursued further professional development, and is an active volunteer and member of his community.
- Sean Cullinane was in his late teens when he was found in possession of marijuana. Now, more than a decade later, Cullinane has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Paulina Easterling was in her late teens when she was found in possession of marijuana during a search following a traffic stop. Now, nearly three decades later, Easterling obtained a GED and a CDL, and she has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Derrick Etherly Jr. was found in possession of marijuana during a search following a traffic stop and later was found in possession of marijuana. Now, more than a decade later, Etherly obtained a technical degree, pursued further professional development, and started a business through which he employs at-risk youth.
- Josh Gates sold marijuana to a confidential informant across three separate transactions. Now, more than a decade later, Gates has completed an electrician apprenticeship, is an active member of his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Adrienne Giles maintained a place for the delivery of controlled substances. Now, more than two decades later, Giles has shown personal growth and positive adjustment, has pursued further professional development, and is an active member of her community.
- Ashley Immel and two other individuals sold a controlled substance to a confidential informant. Now, nearly two decades later, Immel has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. Her pardon received support from a law enforcement officer who attests to her moral character.
- Curtis Korn was found in possession of a controlled substance. Now, more than a decade later, Korn started his own business, pursued further professional development, organizes annual charity events, and is an active volunteer and member of his community. The Court and District Attorney's Office support his pardon.
- Coty Marsh was found to be maintaining a place for the delivery of marijuana/controlled substances and later violated the condition of her bond and was found in possession of marijuana on a different occasion. Now, more than three decades later, Marsh obtained an associate degree in medical assistance and phlebotomy, obtained a CDL, and is an active volunteer within her community. Her pardon received robust support from family, friends, and members of her community.
- Thomas Matthews Jr. sold a controlled substance to an undercover officer and later was found in possession of a firearm. His pardon received robust support from friends, family, and members of his community.

- Lemond McCullum violated the terms of his bond, and almost two years later, was found in possession of marijuana. Now, nearly two decades later, McCullum obtained a technical diploma and a CDL, received awards related to his employment, and is an active member of his community.
- Nicholas Miresse was found in possession of a controlled substance. Now, more than a decade later, Miresse organizes an annual fundraiser for pancreatic cancer research, is an active volunteer within his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. His pardon received robust support from friends, family, and members of his community.
- Mark Nakielski was found in possession of marijuana and a firearm during a search following a traffic stop. Now, more than a decade later, Nakielski earned an associate degree in electro-mechanical technology, started a business, and is an active member and volunteer within his community.
- Steven Noak was found in possession of marijuana. Now, more than a decade later, Noak has shown personal growth and positive adjustment and is an active member of his community.
- Erin Nonn failed to report to jail. Now, more than a decade later, Nonn has shown personal growth and positive adjustment and is an active member of her community. The Court supports her pardon.
- Gabriel Nunez and another individual sold marijuana to a confidential informant and was later found to be in possession of marijuana, all of which he had not paid taxes for. Now, more than three decades later, Nunez has pursued further education, is an active volunteer and member of his community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. His pardon received robust support from friends, family, and members of his community.
- Tiffany O'Neal-Ring maintained a place for the delivery of marijuana/controlled substances at her residence. Now, more than a decade later, O'Neal-Ring has shown personal growth and positive adjustment and is an active volunteer within her community. The Court supports her pardon.
- Kizzy Pierce maintained a place for the delivery of marijuana/controlled substances at her residence during a search warrant. Now, nearly three decades later, Pierce is pursuing further education, has pursued professional development, and is an active volunteer and member of her community.
- Jesse Purifoy was found in possession of a controlled substance during a search following a traffic stop and later was found in possession of marijuana. Now, more than a decade later, Purifoy has obtained an HSED, obtained a technical degree in automotive maintenance, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.
- Heather Raymond was found in possession of a controlled substance with intent to manufacture during a search following a traffic stop. Now, more than three decades later, Raymond obtained bachelor's and master's degrees in nursing and volunteers with young adults struggling with substance use and victims of sex trafficking.
- Walker Rowcliffe was in his late teens when he was found in possession of marijuana during a search following a traffic stop. Now, more than a decade later, Rowcliffe started a business, is an active volunteer within the human trafficking prevention community and is an active member of his community. His pardon received robust support from friends, family, and members of his community.

- Fonda Scott was found in possession of a controlled substance during a search following a traffic stop and later was found in possession of a controlled substance. Now, more than two decades later, Scott obtained an HSED and a certificate in medical assistance and is an active volunteer within her community.
- Mark Shaw sold marijuana to an undercover officer on separate occasions. Now, nearly four decades later, Shaw has shown personal growth and positive adjustment and is an active member of his community. His pardon received support from a retired law enforcement officer who attests to his moral character.

- Walter Carter was found in possession of and selling controlled substances. Later, he was twice found in possession of marijuana. Now, more than two decades later, Carter has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Camisha Clark was a passenger in a car with two individuals who went on to commit a violent crime, and she failed to report them to the police. Later, Clark attempted to pass two fraudulent checks at a bank. Now, two decades later, Clark has obtained a bachelor's degree in accounting and is an active member and volunteer within her church. The District Attorney's Office supports her pardon.
- Samir Chehade intentionally set fire to his business. Now, more than three decades later, Chehade obtained an associate degree in business administration, completed employment-related certifications, and is an active volunteer and member of his professional community. Chehade received robust support from friends, family, and community members who attest to his moral character.
- Brad Elwing was in his mid-teens when he and other individuals entered numerous garages and stole property. Now, nearly three decades later, Elwing obtained an HSED and started a business through which he sponsors community events. The District Attorney's Office supports his pardon.
- Kevin Jackson and another individual stole cigarettes from a gas station. Now, nearly a decade later, Jackson has pursued further employment-related certifications and trainings, and he has shown personal growth and positive adjustment.

member of his professional community, and coached youth baseball and football. Kimmons received robust support from friends and his professional community who attest to his moral character.

Now, over three decades later, Mitchell obtained an associate degree in human services, earned employment and community service-related certifications, is an active member in his church and community, and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. Now, more than three decades later, Harris obtained a bachelor's degree and master's degree in social work, started a nonprofit organization that works to prevent domestic abuse, and is an active volunteer within his community. The Court supports his pardon.
- Antonio Hosey was found in possession of marijuana and later, was found in possession of a firearm and marijuana with the intent to deliver. Later, Hosey was again found in possession of marijuana. Now, over a decade later, Hosey completed college coursework in music production, completed employment-related training and certifications, and started a business.
- Michael Italiano was found in possession of marijuana and a controlled substance with the intent to deliver. Now, over three decades later, Italiano obtained an associate degree

in computer science, pursued further professional development, and is an active member and volunteer within his community.

- Kevin Kraatz was found with drug paraphernalia and to have kept and manufactured marijuana. Now, nearly three decades later, Kraatz is an active member of his community. Kraatz received robust support from friends and his professional community, who attest to his moral character.
- Danny LaFontant was found in possession of a controlled substance. Now, over a decade later, LaFontant is pursuing a master's degree in IT management, completed employment-related training and certifications, provides mentorship to youth through his employment, and is an active member and volunteer within his community. - Chai Moua was in his late teens when he and three other juveniles operated vehicles without the owners' consent and stole property. Now, over three decades later, Moua obtained a HSED, actively volunteers in his community, and serves as a board member in his church.
- William North was in his late teens when he sold a controlled substance to an undercover officer and was in his 20s when he again sold a controlled substance to an undercover officer. Now, more than two decades later, North obtained a CDL, started a business, provides mentorship to youth, and is an active volunteer within his community. North received robust support from friends, family, and community members who attest to his moral character. The Court supports his pardon.
- Bryan Nutter was in his late teens when he sold a controlled substance and marijuana to undercover officers. Now, nearly four decades later, Nutter obtained a bachelor's degree in medical technology, obtained real estate licensure and pursued further professional development, and is an active volunteer within his community.
- James Paine was in his late teens when he was found to be selling and in possession of marijuana, and he was in his 20s when he was found to be in possession of a controlled substance during a traffic stop. Now, over two decades later, Paine obtained a forklift certification and has shown personal growth and positive adjustment. The Court supports his pardon.
- Angelo Pettis was in his late teens when he was found to be in possession of marijuana and later, was again found twice to be in possession of marijuana. Now, over a decade later, Pettis volunteers with multiple community organizations, is an active member of his

Now, over two decades later, Stewart obtained a bachelor's degree in psychology, an associate degree in paralegal studies, and a minor in Africology, and is an active member and volunteer in his community. The Court and an alderman support his pardon.
